## Elements of Rhetorical Analysis

The elements of any rhetorical situation are these:	
The <b>purpose</b> for writing	The <b>persona</b> or assumed role of the writer
The <b>audience</b> for whom the writing is done	The <b>message</b> or <b>content</b> of the writing

## Four Questions for analytical reading

When you need to understand a writer's rhetorical situation, ask these questions:

Purpose 1

What action does the speaker want the audience to take?

to vote to but faithin

Audience

Pathos—how does the speaker anticipate and manipulate the audience's emotional reaction?

Ethos

Speaker make

Limself credible like

Ethos—how does the speaker establish common values with the audience? How does the speaker create a common ground for speaker and audience?

Argument

Logos—how is the message presented? What figurative language? What mode of discourse (compare/contrast, cause/effect, classification and division, et al.) does the speaker employ to convey

the message? organizing

Analyze the distance
